

Studentsmust present records validated by a physician or health clinic for all immunizations required by Texas public schools for to enrollment. Waivers for immunization as the requested for medical reasons or reasons of conscience, including a religious Feliekemption based on reasons of conscience, the Schoolcan honor only official forms issued by the Texas Department of State Health Services (TDSHS), Immunization Branch. This form may be obtained by writing the TDSHS Immunization Branch (MC 1946), P.O. Box 149347, Austin, Texas 78714 9347; or on the TDSHS website

Theform must be notarized and submitted to the Principal within 90 days of notarization.

GradeLevelEligibility

A child is eligible to attend kindergartenif he/she is five years of age on or before September 1 of the current school year. A child is eligible to attend first grade if he/she is six years of age on or before September 1 of the current school year.

Withdrawal of Studentsfrom School

A student under the age of 18 may be withdrawn from school only barent or the legal guardian. The campus registrar will initiate the withdrawal paperwork. The campus must receive notice of intent to withdraw at least threedaysin advance of the withdrawal. Acopyof the

State law requires that students must be in attendance for a minimum of 90% of the instructional daysper year in order to be promoted. A student who attends fewer than 90% of the instructional days per year may be referred to the campus attendance committee for review.

Exemptions to Compulsory Attendance

Statelaw allows exemptions to the compulsory attendance requirements for several types of absences if the student makes up the work. These include the following activities and events:

We ask that appointments be scheduled butside of school hours as much aspossible Alsonote that picking up achild early on a regular basis results in missed opportunities the rincipal has granted approval because of extenuating circumstances a student will not be released before the end of the school day. State rules require that parental consent be obtained before any student is allowed to leave ampus for any part of the school day. The System has put the following procedures in place in order to document parental consent:

• For students in elementary, a parent or otherwise authorized adult must come to the office and sign the student out. Please be prepared to show identification. Once an identity is verified, a campus representative will then call for the student or collect the student and bring him or her to the office. For safety purposes and stability of the learning environment, we cannot allow you to go to the classroom or other area unescorted to pick up a student. If the student returns to campus the same day, the parent or authorized adult must sign back into the main office upon the student's return. Documentation regarding the rean for the absence will also be required.

Tardiesand EarlyDismissal

Punctuality is an important trait that shows respect and consideration for fellow students and teachers and prepares students for the academic day. The student webroessively tardy or the student who consistently leaves the campus early will miss valuable instructional time. This lossof instructional time in a classcould result in the student not receiving credit for the classor possibly for the school year. Each mpus may have specific tardy policies that will be communicated to students and parents. Compulsory attendance regulations apply to students who may miss a portion of the school day as well as those who are absent.

Make-Up Work

Students are expected to make up any work missed and will receive grades earned on the makeup work. Students will have the same number of days to complete assignments as they were absent. Make-up work will not be given in advance however during a length yillness (no less than three days), special arrangements may be made with the teachers a rid to part.

Disciplinaryor other action maybe taken even if the conductdid not rise to the level of bullying. Available counseling ptions will be provided to these individuals as well as to any students who have been identified as witnesses to the bullying. Any retaliation against a student who reports an incident of bullying is prohibited.

Section 504 is a federal law designed to prohibit discrimination against individuals with disabilities. When an evaluation is requested, a committee will be fortined determineif the child is in need of services and supports under Section 504 to receive a free appropriate public education (FAPE), as this is defined in federal law. EnglishLanguageLearner

A student with limited English proficiency (LEP), sometimes referred to as an Emergent Bilingual(EB) student, is entitled to receivespecialized services from the System. To determine whether the student qualifies for services, a Language Proficiency Assessment Committee (LPAC) will be formed, ich will consist of both Schopersonnel and at least one parent representative. The student's parent must consent to any services recommended by the LPAC for a stredent. The Texas English Language Proficiency Assessment System (TELPAS) will also be administered to EB students who qualify for services.

StudentIllness

When your child is ill, please contact the school to let them know he or she won't be attendingthat day. It is important to remember that schools must exclude students with certain illnesses for periods of time as dentified in state rules. For example, if your labeled has a fever over 100 degrees, he or she must stay out of school until they are fever free for 24 hours without fever reducing medications. In addition, students the diarrheal illnesses must stay home until he/she is diarrhea free without diars the pressing medications for at least 24 hours. - Should your child need to have medication at school, please bring or make arrangements or the medication be brought by a parent or a guardian. For your convenience, many the local pharmacies will provide a second labeled container for medications needed at school.
